



Number of House Bills that Passed the House







Most Bipartisan House Freshmen by Party




Percent of bills cosponsored for the opposite party:






Most Active House Freshmen on Twitter



Number of Tweets from 1/1/19 to 7/31/19 from Legislative Accounts






Most Active House Freshmen on Facebook



Number of Posts from 1/1/19 to 7/31/19 from Legislative Accounts






Most Active House Freshmen on Instagram



Number of Posts from 1/1/19 to 7/31/19 from Legislative Accounts

















Most Active Senators Up for Re-Election





Most Bipartisan Senators Up for Re-Election




Percent of bills cosponsored for the opposite party:






Percent of bills cosponsored for the opposite party:




Least Bipartisan Senators in the 116th Congress




Percent of bills cosponsored for the opposite party:
